THANK YOU FOR YOUR PATIENCE as we catch up on fulfilling the 2010 membership renewal packages. We just received the 2010 Frosty Family Christmas Adult Membership Brooches from the manufacturer around the beginning of June, and we have been working hard to get the kits in the mail ever since, starting with those members who renewed in January and working our way forward from there.

At the time of press, this year's 2010 companion earrings are expected to arrive any time, and we will soon start filling orders for those. The earrings are a complement to the 2010 Frosty Family Christmas brooch and cost \$35 plus \$2 shipping, unless the earrings are ordered at the same time that you renew your membership. In that case, the earrings will be shipped along with your membership renewal package at no extra shipping charge.

We also have four other companion earrings in stock: Hug Me, companion to the 2003 junior pin; Winter's Friend, companion to the 1992 adult brooch; Summer Celebration, companion to the 2009 adult brooch; and Fall Friends, companion to the 2008 adult brooch.

All earrings are available only to current members of the Society. They are 1-1/8" in diameter and made of the same thin, lightweight porcelain from which the Moss ornaments are made. The settings are gold plated, and the pierced ear drop findings will be similar to the one pictured above on *Frosty Family* Christmas. All earrings are packaged in an attractive jewelry box.

New Rewards Program

When you receive your 2010 membership card, you will notice that there is a barcode on the back. This barcode is your very own and can be read by the barcode scanners at participating Moss galleries when you present it to them when making a P. Buckley Moss purchase. The purpose is to reward you with points for each purchase, which may be traded in for a gift certificate when you reach certain prescribed levels.

The lion's share of the software has been written and we are now entering the testing phase. After the dealers meeting, August 6-8, we hope to have the first galleries up and running with the program, and you will be able to benefit from a major new members-only privilege.

To use you card, all you need to do is present it to your participating Moss gallery when you buy a piece of Pat's art or one of her gift items. The gallery software will record your purchase and assign points to your rewards account equal to the dollar amount of your purchase.

When you have accumulated 500 points, the "first level", you will be sent a \$25 gift certificate to be used on a future purchase at any participating Moss gallery. The gallery will honor the gift certificate and will in turn be reimbursed by P. Buckley Moss Galleries in the form of a credit to their account for the face value of the certificate. As you purchase more and you reach higher levels, the gift certificates keep on coming.

To make it more fun, and so that you may accumulate points more quickly, we are occasionally going to announce special, short-term rewards programs. For example, those Society members who attended the Williamsburg Convention and bought a piece of Pat's art there will receive a special 25 point bonus on top of their recorded purchase.

Full details on the program will be made available to you and the galleries as they are finalized. Please remember that the rewards program will "work" only with purchases of Pat's art and does not include framing.

\$1,300 award from the P. Buckley Moss Endowed Scholarship. Zach also won 1st Place in the Governor's School's art exhibit "26 Points of View" that was held at the P. Buckley Moss Museum in April. Pat herself juried the show and loved the three-dimensional

quality and texture of Zach's work.

Each morning Zach takes courses in art history and appreciation, humanities, and studio production. Then he returns to Buffalo Gap High School for afternoon classes. Zach states, "Although I am labeled with a learning disability, it does not make me a slow learner. I am very well-versed in current events, have traveled, and love history. I have to get books on audio and study longer hours. I am a visual learner and have a vivid imagination. In a unique way, my learn-

> ing disability has made me a stronger artist. I work harder on my art to overcome all deficiencies in other areas."

Zach will be attending the Delaware College of Art and Design, where he wants to experience all mediums, investigating the mix of art and sound design.

Fallon Crossman, who will be in her senior year at Mount Ida College in Newton, Massachusetts, will receive a \$500 renewal scholarship. Fallon has received awards from the P. Buckley Moss Endowed Scholarship for the past three years, making this her fourth such award.

Each semester, the Interior Design Project at Mount Ida includes a Design Studio. This semester Fallon says, "Design Studio VI consists of Institutional Design, History of Furniture, Lighting Design, and Introduction to Design Theory & Criticism." She will also take liberal arts courses in Major American Writers and History of Civilization II. Fallon will also have an

Interior Design Internship. Fallon states, "By being placed in the

professional work environment, I will gain first-hand experience in my preferred area of Interior Design."

As in past years, Fallon continues to participate in The Learning Center, a program which supports students with learning disabilities. Her academic coach has

helped her figure out the best ways to learn and be successful, such as taking on-line quizzes in paper form.

Fallon will be graduating from Mount Ida in 2011 with a degree in Interior Design and will have reached her goal of becoming an Interior Designer. Always aiming high, Fallon is already setting her future goals. She wants to take the NCIDQ (National Council for Interior Design Qualification) exam. The NCIDQ certificate demonstrates that an individual is highly qualified through education, experience, and examination to competently practice interior design.

result, I understand how important it is to recognize and reward the achievements and hard work of children with learning differences."

This year's recipient is truly a remarkable young man. Taylor Bohon is a senior at Cave Spring High School in Roanoke, Virginia, who plans to major in pre-law at Hampden-Sydney College. Taylor has long-term goals of becoming a lawyer, running for elected office,

and possibly becoming President of the United States one day. Of his future plans, Taylor says, "I want to bring my history, my passion and my determination to my career. Many told me all my life, that college would never be possible for 'someone like me'. I beat those odds and I believe that 'someone like me' can become the leader of this great country."


Taylor has been diagnosed with dyslexia, dysgraphia, and an additional disability that relates to visual perception (1 of 9 diagnosed in the country). Although he does not have any physical sight issues, Taylor sees in mosaic and does not see letters and numbers in their entirety. This combination of learning differences led to Taylor's being misunderstood by many of his teachers.

Instead of giving up hope or losing faith in himself, he worked hard to succeed. Taylor has developed coping skills and uses computer programs to assist in writing, spelling, and reading. He learns largely by what he is taught verbally. Taylor has a strong work ethic, dedication, and perseverance. Among his achievements are membership in The Beta Club (a club for students with a grade point average of 3.6 or higher), a current grade

point average of 3.9, and induction into The National Society for High School Scholars (this organization recognizes "superior academic success").

Taylor has served for two years as captain of his school's cross country, indoor track, and outdoor track teams. Participation on the teams and serving as their captain have taught him strong leadership skills and ethics. Taylor works full-time in the summer and part-time during the school year at a cattle farm and has worked there for four years.

Taylor was nominated for this scholarship by Ed Morgan of Hardy, Virginia, who is a member of the Moss in the

The matted prints brought in an amazing \$2,240 for the Foundation.

Pat's Wildlife Art

Pat is inspired by the world around her, whether it's her family and own life experiences or architecture or nature. Pat's artistic eye takes great joy in the rich colors of spring and fall and also in the crisp, clean lines of winter. Likewise, Pat has always been fascinated by the animal kingdom.

Pat is not the type of artist who paints wildlife in realistic detail, but instead she captures the spirit of the animal and its natural surroundings. Pat's expressive representation of animals elevates her subjects to a symbolic level. Her familiar geese and horses, stripped of unnecessary detail, are composed of bold, fluid lines that speak of the animals' grace, nobility, and natural equilibrium. Most often, Pat's animals inhabit and preside over an orderly world; and, where they are depicted with humans, they are uniformly in harmony with each other.

Some of Pat's recent wildlife paintings are a response to news reports on the environment and

global warming, notably On the Edge (polar bears) and Winter Friends (penguins). Under the Sea captures the aquatic agility of the sea turtle, where the plant life itself is a joyous, vibrant expression of nature's energy; all this perhaps tempered by the daily news stories of the oil spill in the Gulf, showing us a fragile world at risk.

From Pat's travels, we have Still Waters (manatees in Florida), and a recent visit to Italy inspired several new pieces featuring mice. The mouse inspiration came when her grandchildren's cat decided to present Pat with the mouse it had just caught.

Pat's paintings of birds are composed in the tradition of the 19th century artist, explorer, and ornithologist John Gould. However, where Gould's paintings are technically precise, the result of intense observation, Pat's are more suggestive and eloquent and truly her own (Perfect Perch, Nesting Time, and As Light as a Thistle).

Chapters Continue Charity Efforts, Activities

MOSS IN THE VALLEY Chapter's (Roanoke, VA) main charity focus this year will be a raffle of the etching The Christening and a patterned, hand-pieced quilt to benefit the Academy of HopeTree Family Services. The HopeTree Academy helps at-risk children and youth as well as adults with intellectual and learning disabilities. To date, Moss in the Valley has donated arts and craft supplies valued at \$300 to the HopeTree Arts Department. Five Chapter members also volunteered and worked on a fun day and fundraiser, "Hot Diggity Dog", sponsored by Hope Tree.

Additionally, Moss in the Valley has donated \$150 in gift cards to Ronald McDonald House for its operating needs and donated items for two goodie bags, with a total value of \$40, for the P. Buckley Moss Collectors' Convention.

HEART OF IOWA Chapter (Ames, IA) held a charity tea and conducted a raffle of a remarqued Remembering the Iowa State Fair to support local educational children/family philanthropic and endeavors. The lucky winner of the remarqued print was Diane Bishop. The framing for the piece was donated by Country Gallery of Story City, IA. The total amount raised was \$2,742.

MOSSAPHILE Chapter (Atlanta, GA) conducted a raffle with two prizes, a framed Cape Hatteras Lighthouse (framing donated by The Framery in Marietta, GA) and a beautiful quilt made by Chapter member Ladye Buckner which featured one of Pat's hand-painted fabric centerpieces. The drawing for the print was held in March during Pat's show with The Framery, and the winner was Shirley Childs. The drawing for the quilt was held during the P. Riverside School is a nonsectarian, nonprofit, private, coeducational day school approved by the Commonwealth of Virginia as a proprietary school. The school provides a multisensory, structured, and rational education for dyslexic children and children with specific languagebased learning differences in grades 1-8. Mrs. Pat DeOrio, founder of Riverside School and a nationally recognized educator for dyslexia, is a charter member of Moss on the James. The money raised during the tea party will be used

to purchase a SmartBoard for a classroom at Riverside.

Chapter members also organized the goodie bags for the Collectors' Convention and volunteered to help out during the opening reception of Pat's exhibit at The Cultural Arts Center at Glen Allen.

MOSS ON THE CHESAPEAKE Chapter (Mathews, VA) is experiencing a revitalization. During the Chapter's May meeting, which was held at The Gallery on Merchants Square in Williamsburg, VA, past Society Board Vice President, Chapters, Peggy Goodwin came and discussed "what chapters do." 
